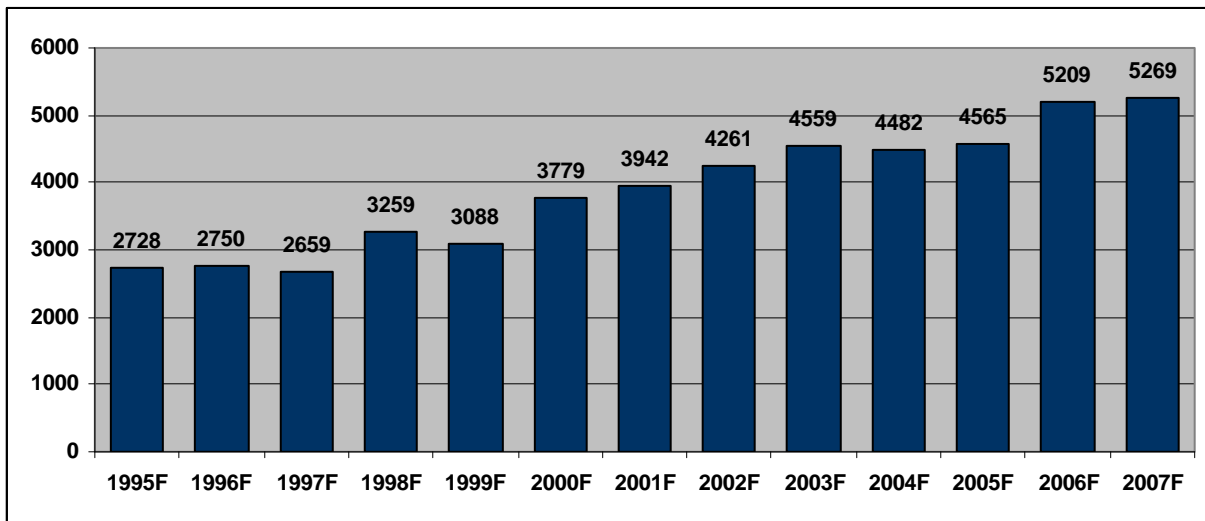

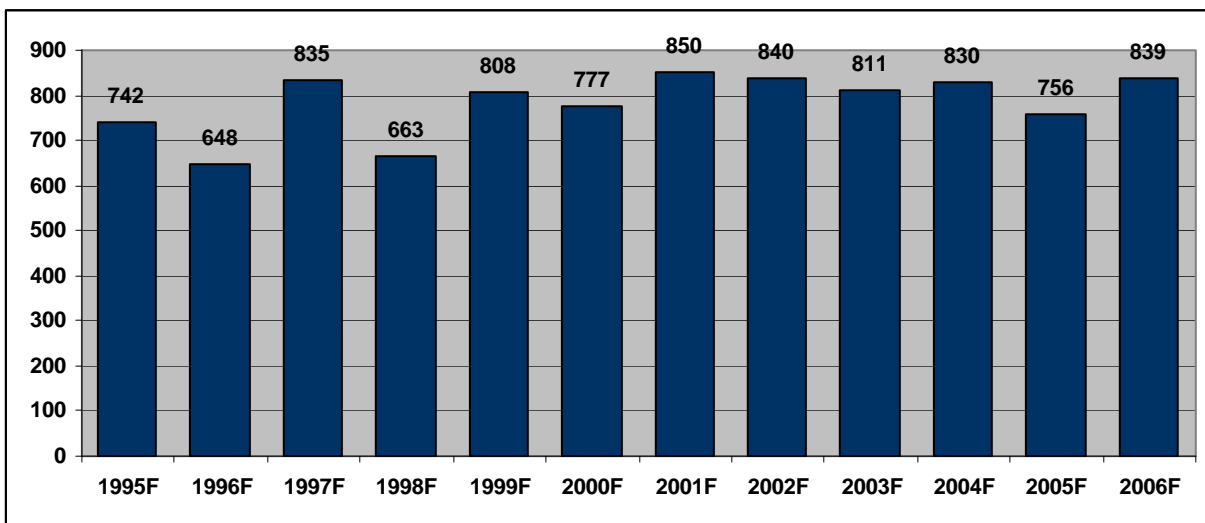
Undergraduate Day Freshmen Applications

- Applications for admission are a measure of market awareness and an indicator of interest. By 2007, freshmen applications had grown 93 percent compared to 1995.



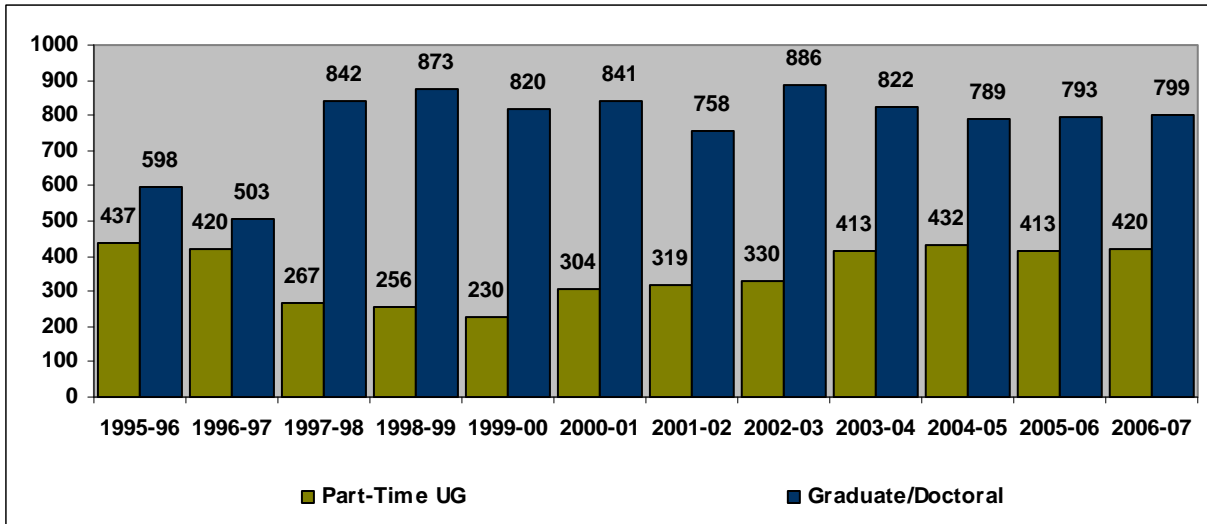
Undergraduate Day Freshmen Classes

- Over the last 25 years, La Salle enrolled freshmen classes of 800 or more eight times. Seven of those eight times have occurred during the last 10 years.
- The percentage of entering freshmen in 2006 who were first-generation college students was 34 percent.
- La Salle's day recruitment program has successfully attracted students from a broader geographic area. In 1999, 35 percent of new freshmen were from outside of Pennsylvania. In 2006, 51 percent came from out of state.



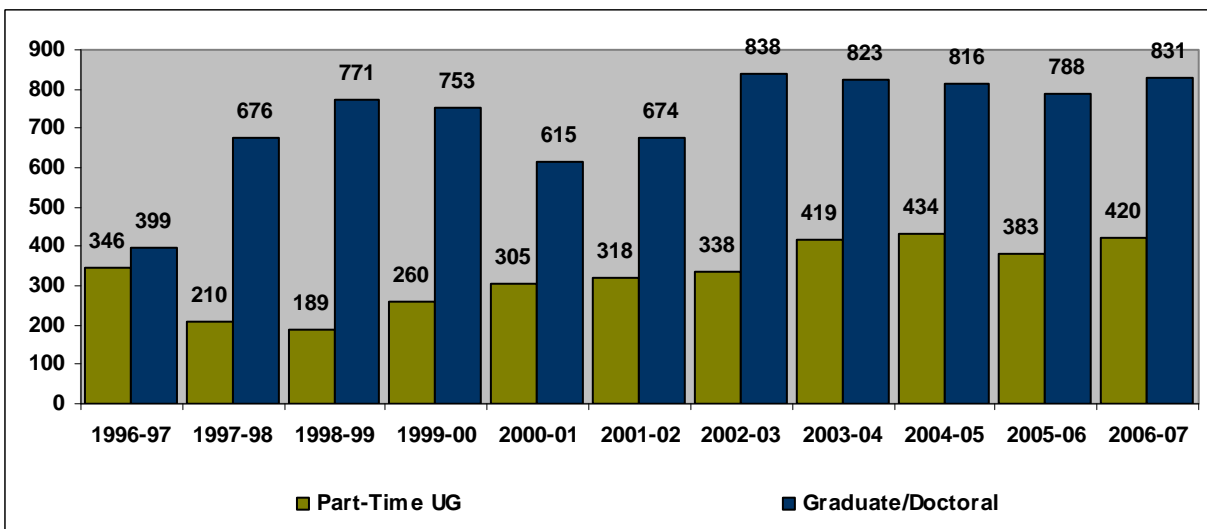
Part-time Undergraduate and Graduate/Doctoral Applications

- Part-time Undergraduate applications have decreased 4 percent compared to 1995-96. However, application volume has increased 83 percent from the lowest point in 1999-00.
- Graduate/Doctoral applications have increased 34 percent compared to 1995-96.



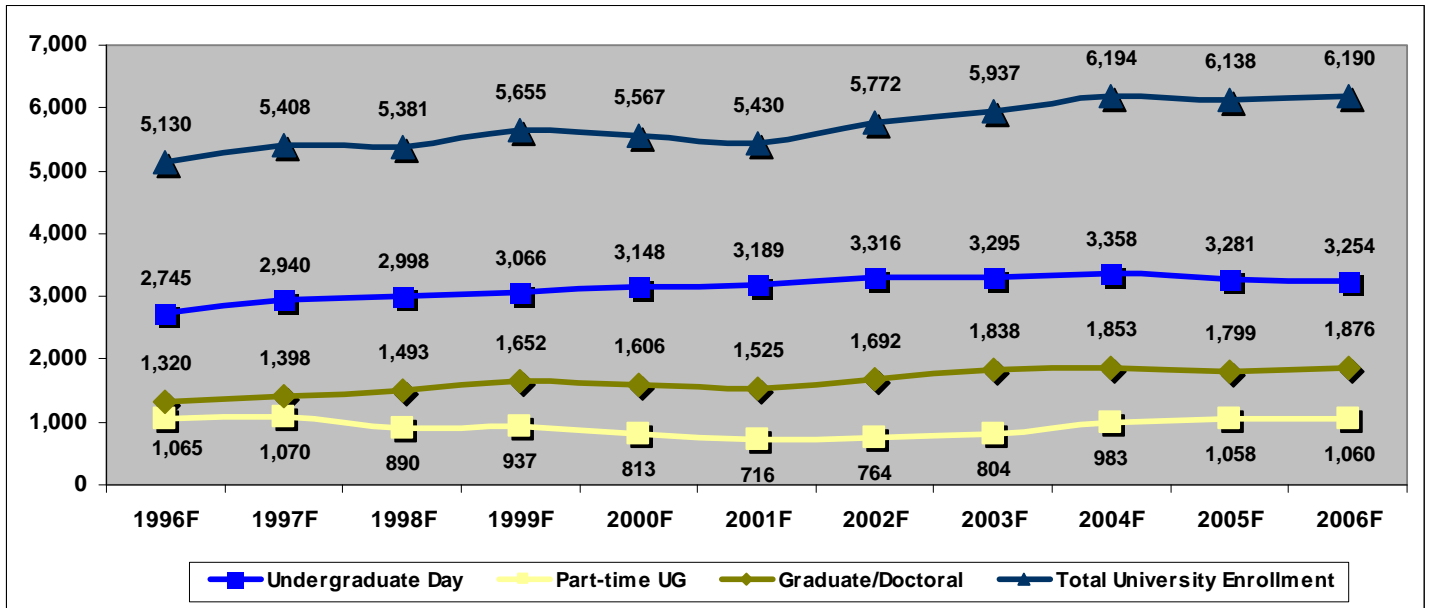
Part-time Undergraduate and Graduate/Doctoral New Students

- The number of new part-time undergraduate students has increased 21 percent since 1996-97 – up 122 percent from 1998-99.
- The number of new graduate/doctoral students has increased 108 percent compared to 1996-97. Over the last 10 years, La Salle has benefited from the addition of new graduate programs. New programs include: Information Technology Leadership, Speech-Language Pathology, History, a full-time MBA option, and La Salle’s first doctoral program.



Total University Enrollment (Fall Census)

- Using Fall census data, total university enrollment has grown 21 percent since 1996.
 - o Undergraduate Day has increased 19 percent.
 - o Undergraduate Part-time has decreased by .5 percent.
 - o Graduate/Doctoral has increased by 42 percent.



Gender Distribution

- Women have constituted the majority of La Salle students since 1985. In Fall 2006, women constituted 62 percent of the University-wide student body.
